

The citizens of our community are experiencing some tough economic times and we are noticing many changes in our statistics. Technology advances are prompting a lot more Internet use of the library. The library has been able to continue to provide BRIDGES eBook/audio services to our patrons. This service has seen a continued growth level and our Facebook page continues to gain support and followers. We have expanded services to include acting as a Proctor for students taking online classes.

BRIDGES is an eService that we subscribe to for our patrons to use to download any form of audio. There are many different formats and genres available. We have had an ever-increasing number of patrons subscribe to use this service. We now have 246 patrons who have registered and used this service for a total of 2,782 circulations this fiscal year!



Most of her research and books concern the Cedar Valley area of Iowa, but she is expanding to other areas, with new books. Linda states, "I enjoy the research and write it to pass the information to our future generations. My grandchildren were the catalyst for me beginning to write". She has written more than 20 books and continues to expand her works. A very interesting program filled with many unknown facts.





Our Friends of the Library worked diligently to produce and perform a production "Love Letters" on February 18 & 19.

Love letters by A.R.Gurney is a reminiscence. It is two people whose lives have been intertwined. It is fun, happy, angry, and sad all in one moment in time. 20 devoted and talented people worked very hard and brought this play to life. It



was a fundraiser for the Friends group but the Library was the benefactor of these funds. It was such a huge success that the attendees asked if this was going to become an annual event. Something similar is being considered.

Look up to the Stars astronomy program (June 2) Kevin Manning, an astronomer and former consultant with NASA, has always been passionate about astronomy. He provided a program as a part of Star Tour 2017. Their aim is to open new galaxies of inquiry and possibilities for people. It was an educational and entertaining exploration of the universe, the stars and other celestial wonders, as well as a refreshingly large perspective gained by looking up to the stars. During this program we were also given the opportunity to view the amazing rings of Saturn, craters of the moon and other jewels of the night sky through a powerful telescope.











"Books for Babies"

68 babies were born at Burgess Health Center in this fiscal year. We were so thrilled to be able to provide this wonderful gift for each child born. This project is funded by John and Carol Murphy and fulfills a long standing wish for us. We have a very good system in place and have been able to supply new books to all the babies born at Burgess Hospital for several years now.



We held our 25th Summer Reading Program this year. 64 children signed up for our program and 48 actively participated. and 41,192 pages were read by the boys and girls. One child going into 4th grade read 6,399 pages alone.

We also had a mural that the boys and girls colored for the entire program so we could display it here in the library. During each program we also drew winners from the boys and girls who attended that day. This seems to be a very big hit with all the participants. Each program also

contained some sort of take home activity for the boys and girls to do. We also had a bookmark creation contest. There were winners chosen and each bookmark submitted was copied and are available here as bookmarks.

Children going into 4th grade had the largest cumulative total once again this year with 12,714 pages.

Programs: 4 Summer Reading Programs with Attendance #1: 34+6 visitors #2: 36+5 visitors #3: 24+5 visitors #4: 27+8 visitors

Program 1 Transform: at your library. Story read was Sydney and Simon go green.

The boys and girls were asked to take the letter of either their first name or last name and reuse puzzle pieces to decorate their initials. Jennifer Macke from Crawford County Extension service was there to tell the kids about taking care of their teeth. Children began coloring the mural.

Program 2 Discover your world. Story read was The Lorax.

The boys and girls made a poster to represent the Truffula Trees in the Lorax. They also made an animal bookmark and continued to finish up the mural.

Program 3 Build a better world. Story read was In front of my house.

A project was done involving the creation of a picture of somewhere that the children imagined by using unexpected art supplies. After they were completed, the children could share what was in their imaginary place and what it represented to them. They were also given a Nature journal that they could complete at home. The final touches were added to the mural.

Program 4 Conserve for a better future. This was our final program so following the Henry Doorly Zoos wonderful presentation on how animals adapt and change to preserve their species, we awarded the prizes for everyone who participated and the top readers of each grade level. The boys and girls were guided on the migration path of the monarch butterfly.

This year the program coordinator was Lindsey Butler. Our programs lasted through the month of June and were well received. The kids seemed to have a really good time and everyone participated in every program. We are always so proud of the children who choose to be a part of our programs, and hope that their teachers can see a difference in learning when they return to school in the fall.
