














How well-informed do you feel about the different services your public library offers?




THE LIBRARY -- GOALS AND PERSONNEL

The citizens of our community are experiencing some tough economic times and we are noticing many changes in our statistics. Technology advances are prompting a lot more Internet use of the library. The library has been able to continue to provide BRIDGES eBook/audio services to our patrons. This service has seen a continued growth level and our Facebook page continues to gain support and followers. We have expanded services to include acting as a Proctor for students taking online classes.

BRIDGES is an eService that we subscribe to for our patrons to use to download any form of audio. There are many different formats and genres available. We have had an ever-increasing number of patrons subscribe to use this service. We now have 246 patrons who have registered and used this service for a total of 2,782 circulations this fiscal year!

68 babies were born at Burgess Health Center in this fiscal year. We were so thrilled to be able to provide this wonderful gift for each child born. This project is funded by John and Carol Murphy and fulfills a long standing wish for us. We have a very good system in place and have been able to supply new books to all the babies born at Burgess Hospital for several years now.

Summer reading program!!!!



We held our 26th Summer Reading Program this year. 64 children signed up for our program and 48 actively participated. and 9,882 pages were read by the boys and girls. One child going into 2nd grade read 1071 pages alone.

We also had a mural that the boys and girls colored for the entire program so we could display it here in the library.

During each program we also drew winners from the boys and girls who attended that day. This seems to be a very big hit with all the participants. Each program also contained some sort of take home activity for the boys and girls to do. Each child was given a song title to listen to before the next program. They then discussed the song, whether they liked it, what they thought it meant, etc.

Programs: 4 Summer Reading Programs with Attendance #1: 36+6 visitors #2: 36+5 visitors #3: 24+6 visitors #4: 27+8 visitors

Program 1 There's a song bird who reads.

The basic rules and ideas of the program were explained to the attendees. This first program dealt with how important poetry is to song. The story read was Green Eggs and Ham. Different poems were read to the beat of the drum to show that rhythm is essential in both! Prizes were drawn for and the children began coloring the mural.

Program 2 Discover your world.

Selections from Shel Silverstein were read to begin the program. We had several make and take crafts for this second program. The boys and girls performed the Musicians of Brennan. Prizes were drawn for and the children continued coloring the mural.

Program 3 Ozzy's "Crazy Games".

Story read was Moana.

All the boys and girls played musical chairs. They had such a good time and the person out each time the music stopped was allowed to help stop the music for the next round. The final touches were added to the mural.

Program 4 Finding your inspirations.

This was our final program and the boys and girls went on a scavenger hunt for some books on specific subjects. They played jumbo Jenga, they also had relay races with monster feet. The Iowa Extension Council also showed them how to make healthy treat choices with local seasonal vegetables. Winners of each division were announced and all prizes were handed out.

This year the program coordinators were James McDermott and E.J. Nagel. The guys lined up other help as they needed it, so we also had several high school students take part in the program. Our programs lasted through the month of June and all the programs were well received. It was a little difficult at first to get the boys and girls to understand that it was ok for the summer to make some noise in the library. The programs were upstairs in the meeting room so we could close the doors to minimize the noise levels for the rest of the library patrons. The kids seemed to have a really good time and everyone participated in every program. We are always so proud of the children who choose to be a part of our programs, and hope that their teachers can see a difference in learning when they return to school in the fall.
