The citizens of our community are experiencing some tough economic times and we are noticing many changes in our statistics. Technology advances are prompting a lot more Internet use of the library. The library has been able to continue to provide BRIDGES eBook/audio services to our patrons. This service has seen a continued growth level and our Facebook page continues to gain support and followers. We have expanded services to include acting as a Proctor for students taking online classes.

BRIDGES is an eService that we subscribe to for our patrons to use to download any form of audio. There are many different formats and genres available. We have had an ever-increasing number of patrons subscribe to use this service. We now have 246 patrons who have registered and used this service for a total of 2,782 circulations this fiscal year.

68 babies were born at Burgess Health Center in this fiscal year. We were so thrilled to be able to provide this wonderful gift for each child born. This project is funded by John and Carol Murphy and fulfills a long standing wish for us. We have a very good system in place and have been able to supply new books to all the babies born at Burgess Hospital for several years now.

We proctor tests for students who need this service. We have had many requests for this service and are happy to help in any way we can for our citizens to further their education and save time and money while doing it.



We are also a passport acceptance facility and have 4 registered agents who can process the applications.

We have been getting people from areas north that cannot get appointments with the Sioux City Post Office. We have been very busy with passports each



year. People come in from Nebraska and the Sioux City area to have us process their forms. It is an amazing service and we are so glad to be able to provide this service for our community.

We held our 27th Summer Reading Program this year. 52 children signed up for our program and 33 actively participated. And over 20000 pages were read by the boys and girls. One child going into 3rd grade read 4518 pages alone.

Our numbers seemed down a little from prior years, but each and every child who attended was so happy to be involved and eager to participate in whatever the activity was.

During each program we also drew winners from the boys and girls who attended that day. This seems to be a very big hit with all the participants. Each program also had a guest reader who entertained the kids with a fun story.

Program 1 Create your own universe.

The basic rules and ideas of the program were explained to the attendees. For the first program the boys and girls painted their own canvas book bag. We provided numerous stencils, paint markers, and other items for them to use. Their creativity really shined through. The bags were amazing. We kept those bags to fill with their prizes at the last program. The story read was "Stuart at the Library" by Susan Hill. Our guest reader was Bill Cain. Both the reader and the attendees had a great time.

Program 2 The gaming universe.

This program was an outdoor day. We played some space related games: Alien Egg Run, which is just a spoon and egg race; "Alien through the Black Hole", a bean bag toss game with squishy alien creatures; and a 3-legged race. They had so much fun with these games we had to play several different times. The story was "Be Quiet" by Ryan Higgins and our guest reader, back by popular demand, was Bill Cain again. We also gave out movie passes from the Iowa Theater to Leila Holverson, Blazen Beerman, Chanceton Kreger, and Tucker Healy for being top readers.

Program 3 One Giant Leap for Reading.

This program featured ventriloquist Lisa Laird! She and her special friends put on a show about the importance of reading and had a few "alien encounters"! It was an amazing show that all the attendees loved. Because of the length of the program, there was no story read. Movie passes were given to Ciana Johnson and Brie Sorensen for being top readers that previous week!

Program 4 *Paint your universe. (Changed to Creatures of the Night)

This was to be another outdoor program but because the weather did NOT cooperate with our plans, we switched ideas and the boys and girls colored nocturnal animal masks. We had mounted the masks to straws to make them easier to handle. Lots of markers and colors made for some beautiful and interesting animals! Our story was "Very short stories to read together" by Mary Ann Hoberman. This story was a two-person story and was read by Jessica and Brooklynn Hupke. Movie pass winners for this program were: Josie VanVoorst and Charis Sorensen.

Program 5 Paint your universe.

Since the weather decided to cooperate with us, we had an outdoor program where everyone decorated our sidewalks with their very own sidewalk art. We handed out small buckets of sidewalk chalk and let them draw whatever their universe contained. So many beautiful things appeared on our walk!
